## **Injury assessment, classification and documentation**

Jason has co-edited and co-authored many publications including the first (and shortly to be published 2<sup>nd</sup>) edition of the Encyclopedia of Forensic & Legal Medicine; Forensic Medicine: Clinical & Pathological Aspects; Symptoms and Signs of Substance Misuse (1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> editions); he is lead author of the 13th Edition of Simpson's Forensic Medicine (the 4<sup>th</sup> edition is in publication); he co-authored the Oxford Handbook of Forensic Medicine and co-edited Age Estimation in the Living and Current Practice in Forensic Medicine.
