Management of persons who have been subjected to a Conducted Energy Device (CED) Discharge

Learning objectives

At the end of the course the HCP will be able to:

- Describe the types of CED available in the UK and the operational principles
- Assess whether there was an underlying medical condition, such as intoxication, psychosis, acute behavioural disturbance, or excited delirium present
- Manage the complications of CED usage including injuries secondary to the discharge, such as traumatic injuries, injuries in sensitive areas, including the face, hand or genitals.
- Demonstrate the taking of a comprehensive history from the patient as well as others involved in the incident and analyse any post-exposure symptoms
- Conduct the appropriate physical examination to include documentation of the probe marks and any other injuries
- Demonstrate the ability to remove the darts
